Celebrating Museum Accreditation

The ARC opened its doors for Heritage Open Days transporting visitors back in time for a journey through the extensive archives. We were proud to welcome Chief Guide, Tracy Foster, to the event and invited her to cut the cake made in recognition of the ARC's achievement of becoming an accredited museum.



On arrival visitors collected their ARC express train ticket and boarded the train for the 1940s.

First stop was camp cooking; making a 'cheese dream' or a pineapple upside-down cake. At this station you could even try the Tenderfoot test!

The next stop was the Tree Circle, a quiet space to remember (or learn about) key people involved in the ARC from the past.

On to Lady Mayhew Woods. Here you could take a moment to have a sweet treat before trying the Escape Tent! Chief Guide, Tracy Foster, joined us here for a s'more break!

Our Escape Tent was set in a train station heading to HQ... but before the train leaves you had to find the trophy! Using the clues and morse code you had to find the answers to escape!

Patteson Lodge was the guiding history hub featuring fascinating displays, a mice history show and Whistlestop Café where you could enjoy a cuppa and scone. Next station was Portrait Place where you could see uniforms through the ages, some from the 1900s and some which feature in our new ARC Trumps card game. Try them on and recreate some old guide photos!

Lots of hard work was needed behind the scenes and on the day to bring the event to life. ARC volunteers had many tasks to do in order to prepare. The ARC has come such a long way, and we are grateful to all those who have helped us along this journey.

"A Guide smiles and sings under all difficulties"

The original eighth Guide Law was definitely obeyed at the 1st Norfolk 1940s Guide Company summer camp this year when Storm Lilian hit with high winds and driving rain. It was a real challenge to keep cheerful, warm and dry!

"We certainly learned why tents need to be stormlashed and how to repair canvas," said camp Captain Aileen Beck. "A variety of weather conditions were admirably managed, to the delight and respect of the Gressenhall staff."

The event at Gressenhall Farm and Workhouse Museum in August was led by volunteers from the ARC (Archive Resource Centre) and saw Guides, Sea Rangers, Cadets (the equivalent of Young Leaders) travel back in time to camp as if they were in the 1940s.

Specially made forties-style uniforms were worn and there was a full programme of 1940s activities, challenges and badge work.

"One highlight was having a retired firefighter join us to work through the 1939 firefighter syllabus, including techniques and rescue procedures of the time," said Aileen.

The Guides and Sea Rangers worked with the farm animals, grooming Suffolk Punch horses and clearing manure from their fields. They made ice cream without any electricity and learned about the ARP (Air Raid Precautions) and Land Girl duties.

"On top of all that, we worked towards the Tenderfoot Test, Second Class, First Class and Able Sea Ranger Test, with the 18-year-olds working on their Cadet Test," she added.

Sea Ranger Zoe was the recipient of the Anne Carter Award for outstanding achievement at camp.

Camp numbers swelled on Saturday when a group of evacuees arrived – in the shape of younger Guides – and, despite the rain, enjoyed camp challenges and Blitz cooking.















Sophie W, who was on her second 1940s camp, said it was interesting to learn about the badges and activities done at the time. "I liked meeting other Guides from the county and my patrol have kept in touch since camp," she said.

Molly was also a returning camper and loved seeing her friends from last year.

"It was different but a good experience for me as I have type one diabetes and had to manage that through the different sort of diet we had."

The 1940s menu included mince and dumplings, corned beef hash and haybox porridge – a camp favourite. The sun did eventually shine once the storm had passed, and many visitors were welcomed and given a guided tour of the campsite by members of the company.

"It was another week of fun, friendship and laughter for all, whether new to camp or returning," said Aileen. "I've heard stories of their authentic 1940s promise badges being worn with pride and comments to the parents on pick up of 'we survived the storm!' and 'see you next year!' We must, of course, thank the farm staff for all their help and support before, during and after the event."

At their pre-camp training day, Aileen read participants one of Agnes Baden Powell's favourite fables from the first Guide handbook. It involves two frogs and a bowl of cream – and the moral of the tale is that if you smile and sing when things look bad you will come through alright. That was certainly true of the 2024 summer camp!

"Want to know the rest of the story?" asked Aileen. "Take a look at Agnes' handbook, "How Girls Can Help to Build up the Empire'!"
