

## Leadership Qualification

In a nutshell, after a few checks on GO, I'm responsible for sending out Leadership Qualification (LQ) books to new leaders in training (LIT) and liaise with the mentor. Once I have received reports forms from the Division verifiers, I post out badges and certificates to Commissioners to present to those who have completed the different Modules of the LQ. I also liaise with mentors, Division verifiers and take part in the Anglia Region LQ coordinators meetings.

Did you know there are things you can be doing towards the LQ even if your unit isn't meeting at the moment? Eg - reading, online trainings, webinars and learning how to use GO - see the help files and find the section 'For Unit Volunteers'. The majority of Leaders in Training will be able to complete the LQ if your unit is holding virtual meetings. There is

a Covid-19 update on the website regarding First Response - just type 'First Response Training' in the GGUK website search box.

There are 5 'Quick Wins' on the Girlguiding Anglia website. Head to www.girlguiding-anglia.org.uk and under 'Blog' scroll back to 24th November 2020 and look at 'Leaders in Training and Mentors - Facebook Interactive'.

Leaders in training, remember your mentor is there to help you, but if she, your unit team or your District Commissioner can't answer your question, please get in touch.

If you are considering starting the LQ, there is document worth reading on the Girlguiding website - 'Getting started on the leadership qualification'. However, I would recommend you spend at least a term as a



Unit Helper first to see if the leadership role is the role for you.

Mentors, by logging on to GO, you'll find there is a webinar and an e learning package both called 'Mentoring' and you can read the Mentors Handbook which is on the Girlguiding website.

## Going Away with Guides

My role as Going Away With (GAW) Adviser for Guides and Rangers is to assist you in achieving a residential licence or a Guide permit.



There are also the Catering and Health & First Aid schemes to achieve.

When thinking about a residential qualification, your first point of call will be your District Commissioner who will then put you in touch with your Division GAW Adviser who will find you a suitable mentor for

the section you volunteer with and will explain everything you need to do.

We assist the Division Advisers to answer any queries and questions that you may have, put on practical and theory trainings for you to gain experience and talk to others in similar situations.

Seeing the girls so happy on residentials and getting the chance to try activities they never even knew existed is what guiding is all about for me.

I'm always on the end of the phone or email, happy to answer any questions you have.

We are looking to offer Zoom trainings very soon, so keep an eye on the website for all the details.

## Queen's Guide

Hello everyone. As Queen's Guide Adviser my role is to keep track of all those working on the Queen's Guide Award in Norfolk. I make sure details are correct on GO and offer help and support to members and their mentors throughout the time they are working on the award. Much of this is done via email, so my favourite part comes when I meet girls on completion of their award, usually with Val Purdy who assesses the Outdoor Challenge trip. We love hearing first-hand about all they have done and can sign off their record book. I post off the book by recorded delivery to Guide Headquarters and then comes an anxious wait until the

book returns signed by the Chief Guide herself. That is the signal for great celebration and for planning a special occasion to present the beautiful badge and certificate to our new Queen's Guide.

The QGA is a personal challenge that can be undertaken by any member aged 16-26. In some ways it is similar to Gold D of E, but with added elements linked to Guiding. As well as working with a unit and others to give Service in Guiding, there are sections following a skill, undertaking community action, an outdoor challenge and attending a residential opportunity. Some flexibilities have recently been introduced to make it more possible to continue with the award while Covid-19 is limiting our activities.

# **Training**

Just like unit meetings, trainings have gone virtual too! Headquarters have increased the range of webinars they are providing: sign in to GO and under your name should be a list of options including 'my events'; click onto that, scroll down to the blue button 'view available webinars' and take your pick! To register, click on the 'Actions' arrow, then 'register'. You should receive confirmation and all necessary details.

Wondering what the Norfolk Trainers are up to? Many of us are now webinar trained, through the Chartered Institute of Personnel and Development and have been involved since the first lockdown with delivering national and regional trainings, especially ensuring the Safe Space requirements could be met! We've also



been delivering First Response sessions virtually for Norfolk since October, so if yours is due to run out soon please look for details of upcoming sessions on the website and book via email. We are now required to complete a 6 hour course consisting of 2 virtual sessions and a face-to-face practical (which is delayed until such times as we can safely meet).

Us Trainers do like to run sessions other than Safe Space or First Response, so if there are any subjects you would like us to cover let us know and we will do our best to put them together. Unfortunately, it is incredibly difficult to find a time that suits everyone, especially as we have commitments with our own units but we are happy to help wherever and whenever we can.
