

The Great Guide Bake Off

After a lot of asking from the Guides (and only slight fear from the leaders), 3rd Hethersett Guides ran their first 'Great Guide Bake Off' meeting.

Guides

18 Guides, and 2 Brownies, visiting as part of their Gold Award, participated in the 'Great Guide Bake Off' and had three timed challenges to complete – the Signature Bake, Technical Challenge, and Show Stopper, which were all judged by special guest judges (another local leader and her husband).

They worked in groups of 4, and came up with a team name to start with. For the Signature Bake, Guides had 20 minutes to create 4 savoury pastry twists using pre-made pastry and a variety of fillings. They all had to be identical in length, and every group had to be cleared up by the end of the time too.

For the Technical Challenge we incorporated one of the Skills Builders from the Express Myself theme we have been working on, and Guides were given a cookie recipe which wasn't quite right, and the science behind why the ingredients are used. They had to use both of these pieces of information to come up with their recipe, which was later taste-tested by the judges.

After a quick snack break, we moved onto the Show Stopper. This time, the Guides had 8 cupcakes per group to decorate and create a 3D display with a nature theme. They had 10 minutes to plan, and then 15 minutes to create their 3D display and hopefully avoid any Pritt Stick or Sellotape making it onto the cupcake decorations... The final 30 minutes of the challenge were then dedicated to decorating their cakes, assembling their

displays, and clearing down their entire work space.

It was then time for the judging, where the judges were looking not only at presentation and taste, but teamwork throughout the challenges and the food hygiene of each group.

With only a couple of tables still being slightly sticky, the winners were announced and received a 'Star Baker' badge. Everyone got a 'Bake Off Challenge' badge and could take home their creations, a win for all the groups!

Despite some trepidation from the leaders about how the bake off would go, all the Guides worked together fantastically to produce some great results.

News from the ARC

The ARC Angels met in February to recreate old badges in different art styles, with some being drawn with true likeness in pencil, and others given an abstract interpretation in pastel or fabric. We had a great time finding badges that we felt resonated with us and getting creative with the art.

This was in preparation for the Heritage Open Days festival later this year. The festival runs every year in September, encouraging the public to visit places with a rich history and culture. The ARC has over 30,000 items from Girlguiding's long history, many items over a century old!

The ARC will be open for Heritage Open Days on Saturday 9th and 16th September and Sunday 10th and 17th September. We also had a special presentation for Sophie Ridge-Ahmed who was awarded her Queen's Guide award. Many county commissioners were visiting the ARC and so were present at this presentation, and were amazed at the extent of the ARC's collection and the ongoing work of the volunteers.

The next ARC Angel meeting will be on Sunday 16th April when we will be taking part in a collage activity as part of Stranger's Hall Centenary as a museum this year. We will be contributing to the community element is a window display called 'What a Pane!'

The idea is for community groups to create collages of renowned Norwich people. Groups have already made lots of collage papers based on designs found in the museum, and then the papers are being turned into portraits of the people.

We are delighted to let you know that the ARC has submitted its application for Museum Accreditation Status. This is comprised of nationally agreed standards to ensure museums are sustainable, focused and trusted, inspiring the confidence of the public and funding and governing bodies.

This has been a huge piece of work, taking place over the past three/four years. There have been numerous policies, action plans, statements, gathering of data and so on assembled and submitted – approximately thirty in all!
