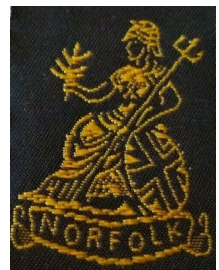

## 100th Birthday Celebrations at Sheringham Trefoil Guild

### Memories of Wilhelmina Payne's long life in the Guide Movement.

Wilhelmina was born on 12th March 1923 in Hilversum, Holland. Her earliest experience with the Guiding movement came through her mother, one of the first Brown Owls in the Dutch Brownies in the 1920's. She became a Brownie in 1930, first as a fairy, then as a gnome. Meeting were held in homes and games in the garden. Sometimes they held bazaars and Wilhelmina recalls grinding peanuts for peanut butter to sell.

From Brownies she went into Guides, in the cornflower patrol. A highlight was in 1937 when the International Jamboree was held in the Netherlands. During the war Wilhelmina continued her education going to teacher training



college and becoming a Guider. At the end of the war the town of Hilversum was visited by Lady Baden-Powell, she complimented them on the biscuits they had made.

In 1947 Wilhelmina married with Brownies and Guides attending before she emigrated to UK with her husband, a British Citizen. They moved to Uxbridge raising their two daughters and Wilhelmina became Brown Owl of 1st Uxbridge pack. She was known as "Mowi". Subsequently she became involved with the Guide Company and camps were held on Hayling Island, Bournemouth, Jersey and Netherlands.

Moving to West Runton in 1980 Wilhelmina joined the Sheringham Trefoil Guild she has enjoyed the many events and even now that it's more difficult to get about. The stimulation of the monthly meetings continue to provide her valuable social contact.

## **Costessey Trefoil Guild**

2023 has started with our normal 'indoors meetings' with some varied, fascinating, topics: Norfolk Accident Rescue Service (NARS) started in 1970 and provides additional support to the regular ambulance service in Norfolk by improving the level of care provided to patients when they need it most. It is funded purely by charity and is staffed by a voluntary team of doctors, critical care paramedics, paramedics, nurses and first aiders.

St Martin's Housing trust - many of us will have thought that St Martins is just a hostel for the night, which is how it started 50 years ago, but we were to learn that it is now far more, having adapted to the changing and complex needs of homeless people. As a measure of their success we learned that in 2016 Norwich had 34 people sleeping rough, but this has now reduced to just 7 and at any one time they are supporting around 200 people in some way. By the end of the talk we had all learned a lot more about this local charity and had various misconceptions swept aside.

Chris then took us back to 1983 and the 15th Scout World Jamboree in Canada. He was one of four leaders and 36 Scouts in Troop 23 representing Norfolk, Suffolk and Cambridgeshire and, for the first time, included two girls as they had recently been permitted to join the senior section in UK. There was a lot of discussion of other Jamborees, Trefoilers they had been involved with over the years. It was fascinating to hear about his trip and consider how things have changed in 40 years --and yet in some ways things remain very similar.

In May, as part of the Big Help Out, Annette and Chris volunteered to help at the Forum. During this event Annette received her Bronze Voyage Award from Frances. Huge congratulations to Annette on this achievement.

Now we are 'out and about for the summer – and keeping fingers crossed for some good weather when we visit the sea, How Hill and go on a 'treasure hunt'. Also we have volunteered to run the Pulls Ferry cafe on Saturday 10th June --- and we would love to see some of our Trefoil friends come along.

## Guiding history comes to life again this Summer at Gressenhall Museum.

### 24th-29th August

Guides and Rangers will be getting a taste of life as it was lived 80 years ago when they travel back in time to the Girlguiding Norfolk 1940s Camp. Gressenhall Farm and Workhouse Museum, near Dereham, is once again the venue for this archive-inspired project in which girls and their leaders aim to recreate wartime camp life as authentically as possible.

That means no mobile phones, nothing made of plastic and definitely no nail varnish! It also means sleeping in bell tents, cooking on wood fires and coping with meals prepared from rationed ingredients.

But despite these “hardships”, girls are keen to join the camp and to take on the challenges it offers. Both Guides and Rangers will work on badges from the 1940s syllabus in a programme specially designed by volunteers at the county’s Archive Resource Centre in Coltishall. Last year’s campers made friends for life and achieved many things they would never have thought possible. They also enjoyed sourcing authentic pieces of kit, making their own gas mask boxes and wearing 1940s uniforms.

This year new Sea Ranger uniforms have been purchased with the help of a legacy from Norfolk Ranger Guider Anne Carter, who was a firm supporter of the ARC. There will also be two “Anne Carter” badges to be awarded for outstanding achievement in both Guide and Ranger sections.
